

## Spoonbill Gallery in Greenville, SC, Features Works by Tessa Pinner and April Schwingle

Spoonbill Gallery in Greenville, SC, will present *Forms of Eden*, featuring works by Tessa Pinner and April Schwingle, which symbolizes the artists' shared exploration of nature through botanical representations on ceramics, on view from Nov. 1 - 15, 2024. A reception will be held on Nov. 1, from 6-9pm.

The exhibition highlights the artists' shared passion for nature, celebrating the delicate interplay between organic forms and the enduring qualities of ceramics. The exhibit aims to immerse visitors in the beauty of nature and the artistry of handmade pottery.

Pinner, whose sculptural work is deeply rooted in her love for gardening, reflects on her process: "My passion for gardening and horticulture inspires my sculptural work. I grow and gather plant material from my garden - leaves, buds, flowers, and fruit - transforming them into casts that preserve their delicate details. These impressions are not mere decorations; they embody the essence of life, capturing a moment in time. The tactile quality of the clay enhances this connection, inviting the viewer to engage with both the botanical forms and the ceramic medium."

Adding her perspective, Schwingle explains her approach: "Building on this foundation, I focus on the interplay of texture and color. By incorporating glazes that reflect the natural hues of the plants, I seek to create a dialogue between the organic and the crafted. Each piece is an invitation to reflect on the relationship between humanity and nature, emphasizing the beauty found in imperfection."

Together, Pinner and Schwingle's work explores themes of fragility and strength, grounded in a shared vision. "Through our combined efforts, we aim to highlight the fragility of the botanical world while celebrating the strength of ceramics," says Schwingle. Forms of Eden encourages a deeper appreciation for the natural world, with each creation serving as a fusion of

the artists' individual perspectives. Their work stands as a testament to collaboration, showcasing the timeless connection between art and nature.

Tessa Pinner is a gardener, designer, and artist. From a young age, she knew that she would be an artist, and that guiding desire has taken several expressions. In 2012, she graduated from Bob Jones University with a BFA in Sculpture, after which she ran a luxury wedding cake studio for six years. In 2015, she discovered a passion for plants and gardening, first embarking on Clemson's Master Gardener Program before earning an AS in Horticulture from Spartanburg Community College in 2020. Pinner has spent time gardening professionally at world-class gardens in England and Pennsylvania. Her career in garden design began at local design and landscape construction firm Dabney Collins, where she worked for five years before transitioning into private consulting and returning to fine art in 2023. Pinner lives in Greenville, SC, with her husband, Brian, and two son

April Schwingle is a potter and full-time professor. Her journey in clay is as much about nurturing future potters as it is about shaping each piece into its final form. With 25 years of teaching experience on the collegiate level, she is dedicated to sharing the transformative power of pottery, guiding students from their first touch of mud to the moment they discover their unique artistic voice. Schwingle earned her master's in arts in 2002 and serves as Department Head of Art at Bob Jones University. She oversees a vibrant pottery studio. She resides in Greenville, SC, with her husband, David, and three sons.
