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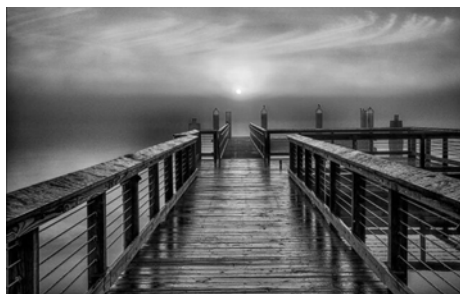
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## Charleston Artist Guild in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Mary Wessner

The Charleston Artist Guild in Charleston, SC, will present *Thru New Eyes – The World in Black and White*, featuring works by Mary Wessner, on view in the Charleston Artist Guild Gallery, from July 1 - 31, 2016. A reception will be held on July 1, from 5pm-8pm.

Mary Wessner mostly photographs in color. She loves color – vibrant sunrises and sunsets, the green leaves of a tree against a dark blue sky, red-faced children playing in the sun. Yet she is drawn to black and white images and loves the drama, emotion, and the ability to look at every aspect of the picture in a more selective and defining way. In this exhibit, Wessner goes out of her comfort zone and looks at the world in a new way – in black and white.

Black and white allows us to concentrate on the image itself rather than the color of the image. Removing color removes any bias the viewer has that might make them perceive the image in a different way than was intended. Many of Wessner's prints are also new ways of looking at objects we might ordinarily ignore. Smoke burning from an incense stick, a tulip past its prime, and everyday objects and places. We know them so well that we stop looking at the details.

We stop “seeing” the image because we assume what it looks like.

You could say Wessner's love of photography is in her genes. Her parents were both avid photographers and taught her the basics of creating a photograph very early on. It wasn't until she attended school for Spiritual Psychology that her perceptions of the world completely shifted and she was compelled to document life in a new and different way. The artist states, “My goal is to capture the inner essence of any subject that I frame, from the soul-searching eyes of an owl to the wilted droop of a past prime tulip. I want every image to evoke some emotion or thought.”

The City of North Charleston's Cultural Arts Department will present two new exhibits including: *Parallel Thoughts/Single Minded: The Art Quilts of Marlene O'Bryant-Seabrook with Prose by EOB3* and *Threading Color – Works by Nora Phillips*, on view in the North Charleston City Gallery, located in the Charleston Area Convention Center in North Charleston, SC, from July 7 - 29, 2016.
